

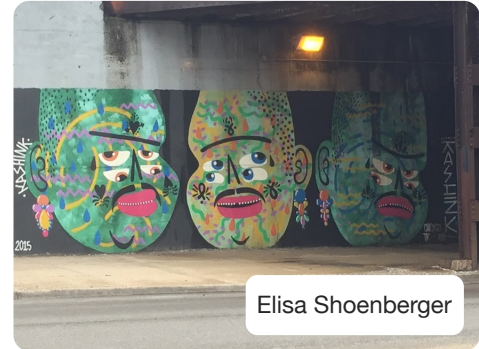

Check out always-changing street murals

Underneath the train tracks of an overpass on West Chicago Avenue, just west of Halsted Street, the ephemeral works of several artists can be found. The artwork here tends to change every 6 months or so: Many pieces are made in conjunction with the exhibition schedule at Chicago Truborn gallery farther west on Chicago Avenue, while others have stuck around for a few years. An example of the latter are the wild multicolored heads made by Paris-based female street artist Kashink. Mike Egan's row of skeleton heads has also been up for quite a while. If you walk a few steps west on Chicago Avenue, you'll find an additional wall for artists.

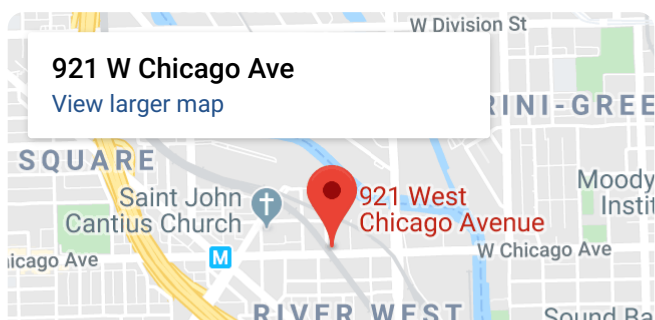

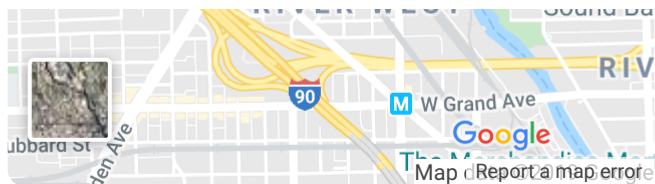
